

What is Internal Auditing?

"Internal auditing is an independent, objective assurance and consulting activity designed to add value and improve an organization's operations. It helps an organization accomplish its objectives by bringing a systematic, disciplined approach to evaluate and improve the effectiveness of risk management, control, and governance processes."


Five Critical Tasks

- 1. Determine whether controls are adequate.
- 2. Suggest improvements to increase efficiency and effectiveness or to lower operating costs.
- 3. Determine whether policies and procedures are followed.
- 4. Determine whether laws and regulations are being obeyed.
- Detect fraud or manipulation of records.



Internal Auditors Assess Risks...

- To help keep bad things from happening.
- To help assure good things can happen.
- To help management understand:
 - Where the risks are
 - Whether the risks are under control
 - Whether the risks are worth taking





Finding Risks Is Not Enough



Internal auditors evaluate the controls that help organizations manage risks.

- Are controls in place?
- Do the controls work?
- Are additional controls needed?
- Are there unnecessary controls?
- Are the controls cost-effective?







Internal Audit Competency Self-Assessment


Competency Self-Assessments Are Higher for Those With Internal Audit Certification

Figure 23. Comparison of Median Salary (Certified vs. Non-certified)


