Congratulations!

The Institute of Internal Auditors (IIA) Trinidad & Tobago Chapter successfully hosted its Special Membership Meeting on Wednesday, May 27, 2026, bringing members together virtually to address important governance matters and participate in a timely professional development session.

During the Special Membership Meeting, members considered and approved key initiatives that will support the continued growth and effective governance of the Chapter. Agenda items included the approval of the revised IIA TT Bylaws and the election of additional Officers and a Governor to serve on the IIA TT Board for the term ending May 31, 2027. The meeting was well received by members, who benefited from both the governance discussions and the practical legal perspectives shared during the presentation. The event reinforced the importance of maintaining high professional standards while ensuring that internal audit reporting remains credible, objective, and capable of withstanding legal scrutiny.

Internal Audit Month: Advocacy Competition 2026

The Institute of Internal Auditors (IIA) Trinidad & Tobago Advocacy Competition 2026 has once again demonstrated the power of collaboration, creativity, and professional advocacy in promoting the value of internal auditing. Held in celebration of Internal Audit Month, this year's competition challenged organisations across Trinidad and Tobago to showcase how internal audit contributes to stronger governance, ethical leadership, and sustainable value creation.

Centred on the global Internal Audit Month theme, **“Internal Audit in Action: Trust. Ethics. Value Creation.”**, the competition encouraged audit teams to develop innovative campaigns that increased awareness of the profession while engaging employees, leadership, and external stakeholders.

A Competition with Purpose

The Advocacy Competition ran from May 1 to June 1, 2026, inviting organisations to submit creative initiatives that highlighted the critical role internal auditors play as trusted advisors and value protectors. Participants were encouraged to move beyond traditional awareness campaigns by embracing innovative communication methods such as storytelling, videos, workshops, social media engagement, and collaborative events.

Entries were assessed on a 100-point scale based on three key criteria:

- **Clarity of Message and Relevance (40 points)** – Effectively communicating the importance of internal audit and aligning with the Internal Audit Month theme.
- **Creativity and Engagement (40 points)** – Demonstrating originality while actively engaging employees and stakeholders.
- **Participation in Internal Audit Month Activities (20 points)** – Encouraging widespread involvement in Internal Audit Month initiatives.

This framework ensured that successful campaigns not only informed audiences but also inspired meaningful participation and reinforced the strategic importance of internal auditing within organisations.

The IIA Trinidad & Tobago Chapter was proudly represented at the 2026 IIA Leadership Academy, held from April 19–21, 2026, in Orlando, Florida. The three-day conference brought together chapter leaders from across North America and the Caribbean to strengthen leadership skills, share best practices, and prepare volunteer leaders for successful chapter governance.

Representing the Chapter were President Martha Prince and Senior Vice President Shamira Ramkissoon. Also attending was Sunil Babooram, current Caribbean District Representative and a past President of the Trinidad & Tobago Chapter.

The Leadership Academy offered a valuable combination of professional development leadership training, and networking. 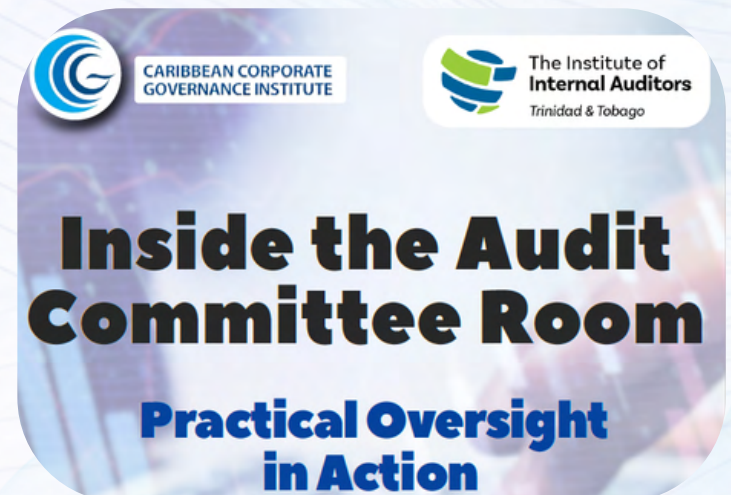

Inside the Audit Committee Room: Practical Oversight in Action

The Caribbean Corporate Governance Institute (CCGI), in collaboration with the Institute of Internal Auditors (IIA) Trinidad and Tobago, successfully hosted the virtual workshop, **Inside the Audit Committee Room: Practical Oversight in Action**, on April 15, 2026. The four-hour programme provided participants with four Continuing Professional Development (CPD) credits and brought together board members, senior executives, company secretaries, internal auditors, and governance professionals seeking to strengthen their oversight capabilities.

Facilitated by governance experts Claire Gomez-Miller and Larry Kowlessar, the workshop bridged the gap between governance principles and real-world boardroom practice. Participants explored the responsibilities of audit committees, financial statement oversight, fraud risk, internal controls, and effective engagement with internal and external auditors. Through interactive discussions, practical exercises, and simulated audit committee sessions, attendees gained valuable insights into applying the Global Internal Audit Standards and managing challenging governance scenarios with confidence.

The workshop reinforced the critical role of audit committees in promoting transparency, accountability, and sound decision-making. INTERNAL AUDIT'S TROJAN HORSE: HOW THE NEW STANDARDS CAN EARN INTERNAL AUDIT A SEAT AT THE TABLE

Picture the scene. The Chief Audit Executive walks the audit committee through the quarterly internal audit update. They discuss the number of audit reviews completed, the status of ongoing reviews, key findings, the long list of open audit issues, and any other matters. A few questions on management's response to recommended actions arise. The chair then thanks the CAE for the update and that, more often than not, is the extent of it. For many of us, this scene feels all too familiar, and the reason is plain enough: time is limited, and the audit committee's agenda is already long.

"That scene is about to change."

The IIA's Global Internal Audit Standards are quietly rewriting what happens in that room and giving the CAE's voice a more deliberate place in it. This is more than a technical update. The new Standards make an internal audit strategy mandatory and the Internal Audit Strategic Plan is a practical document functions can use to evidence and operationalise that requirement. And the quiet truth is that while the plan serves as a conformance requirement on the surface, it is also a negotiation tool underneath. That is IA's Trojan Horse.

The Plan That Connects IA to the Business

The annual Internal Audit Plan answers an important question: what will IA review this year? The audit findings log answers another: what has IA found? Both are useful and necessary, but neither fully answers the question every audit committee eventually asks: what is this internal audit function building toward, and how does it connect to where the business is going?

That is the role of the IA Strategic Plan. It connects the function's work, capabilities, investments, and priorities to the organisation's strategic direction. The plan demonstrates that IA is not running a parallel exercise alongside the business. It is supporting the business in delivering the strategic targets the board itself has set. That alignment is what allows the board to see IA's value. Not as a compliance function operating in the background, but as a deliberate contributor to strategic delivery that is visible, connected, and focused on the priorities that matter most to the business.

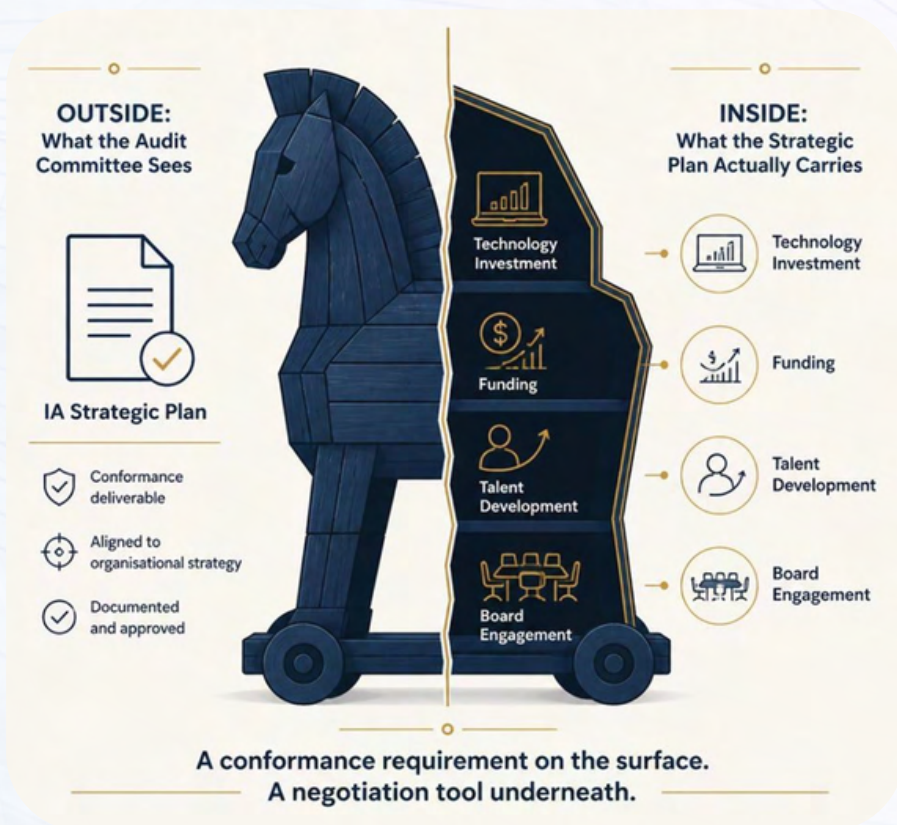
Not long ago, I worked with a CAE who had drafted her function's first Strategic Plan. It was not lengthy, and it was not overly polished. It included a simple vision, a capability gap analysis, and a one-page view of how internal audit's work mapped to the organisation's strategic priorities.

After presenting it to her audit committee, she later shared that the committee chair described it as one of the most useful documents the function had ever put forward.

That moment says something important. The IA Strategic Plan does not have to be perfect to be valuable. It has to exist. It has to make the function's direction visible, and it has to create a better conversation than the one internal audit has been having for years.

THE STRATEGIC PLAN AS A TROJAN HORSE—DECODED



Here's what I mean by "Trojan Horse"—and I'll keep it simple. In the old story, a city that could not be taken by force was entered through a gift left at its gates. The gift looked harmless from the outside, but it carried something far more consequential within it.

The IA Strategic Plan works in a similar way. On the outside, it looks like a conformance deliverable, another document required by the Standards. But on the inside, it carries the conversations IA functions have been having in pieces for years, around technology investment, funding, talent development, and board engagement—and graduates them from annual asks into strategic commitments.

That is what makes the Strategic Plan IA's Trojan Horse. The document gets through the door as a Standards requirement. The real value is the strategic conversation it now brings into the boardroom by default.

The new Standards push three conversations IA functions have historically had only implicitly:

What is our vision?

In my experience working with local IA functions, I've seen this framed differently. Some put it simply as "helping managers achieve objectives," others more ambitiously state it as becoming "a trusted partner in risk management and governance." Both are crisp, and both move IA out of the shadows.

How do we create value?

Through risk-based focus, foresight, and an advisory posture. Not just retrospective assurance.

What capabilities do we need

Skills and certifications like CIA, CRMA, CISA, CFE, technology investment, a live Quality Assurance and Improvement Program (QAIP), and a charter that is actually refreshed on a defined cycle, not just when an External Quality Assessment (EQA) is around the corner.

The act of writing IA's strategy from scratch—naming the vision, articulating the value, mapping the capability gaps is what finally gives the audit committee a clear line of sight into where internal audit is going, and why it belongs at the table where strategy is set.
